Applied Fashion Design and Technology

VCE/VCAL/VM: Students may be eligible to receive recognition of up to six units of credit: four units at the Units 1 & 2 level, and a VCE VET Units 3 & 4 sequence.

ATAR: This subject does not have a study score and therefore cannot contribute towards the student's primary four. Students who receive a Units 3 & 4 sequence may be eligible for a 10% increment towards their ATAR (10% of the lowest result of your primary four scaled studies). Please note the student must already have English and three other fully scored VCE/VET subjects to create the primary four. VCAL and the VCE Vocational Major do not contribute towards an ATAR.

Automotive Vocational Preparation (General)

VCE/VCAL/VM: Students may be eligible to receive recognition of up to four units of credit: two units at the Units 1 & 2 level, and a VCE VET Units 3 & 4 level.

ATAR: This subject does not have a study score and therefore cannot contribute towards the student's primary four. Students who receive a Units 3 & 4 sequence may be eligible for a 10% increment towards their ATAR (10% of the lowest result of your primary four scaled studies). Please note the student must already have English and three other fully scored VCE/VET subjects to create the primary four. VCAL and the VCE Vocational Major do not contribute towards an ATAR.

Automotive Vocational Preparation (Pathways to Success)

VCE/VCAL/VM: Units completed may contribute hours toward a student's secondary studies.

Students complete selected units which can provide credit toward further studies in the Certificate II in Automotive Vocational Preparation.

Allied Health Assistance (Incorporating Health Services Assistance) Partial Completion

VCE/VCAL/VM: Students may be eligible to receive recognition of up to four units of credit: one unit at the Units 1 & 2 level, and a minimum of three units at the Units 3 & 4 level.

ATAR: Students wishing to receive an ATAR contribution for the Units 3 & 4 sequence must undertake scored assessment for the purpose of achieving a study score. This study score can contribute directly to the ATAR, either as one of the student's best four studies (the primary four) or as a fifth or sixth study. VCAL and the VCE Vocational Major don't contribute to an ATAR.





It also covers the skills and knowledge required to perform minor maintenance and repair of an automotive vehicle body.

This program offers the opportunity for students to experience the Automotive industry from state of the art Docklands campus with access and links to the latest technology and industry partners.



Certificate III In Allied Health Assistance

Course description:

This course will provide students with the foundation skills and knowledge to undertake further studies or employment in a health related field.

Is ideal for individuals who would like to work with physiotherapists, speech therapists, podiatrists and occupational therapists.

Allied health assistant roles are becoming more involved in the assessment and planning of therapeutic and rehabilitation programs.

Course Duration: 1st Year Wednesday 9.00am – 12.00pm 2nd Year Wednesday 1.45pm – 4.45pm

This course will not accept Year 12 students into the 1st year.

This course can be undertaken as a scored assessment.

Placement

- Placement is part of the units of competency 40 hours must be completed in each year.
- Arranged and undertaken during term breaks (July or Sept/Oct)
- Arranged by the student with support from the student's school and IMVC
- Placement booklet outlining the duties and roles of the student and supervisor and the performance evidence required of the student
- Area's such as physiotherapy, hospital wards, occupational therapy, rehabilitation centre, local community health centre, aged care



Benefits and Opportunities

- Contribute to the eligibility requirements for VCE or VCE VM
- Contribute to your ATAR score (only for scored assessment)
- Develop 'job ready' skills and experience in the health sector
- Receive a National Statement of Attainment
- Provide pathways and/or credits towards higher level courses (TAFE or University)



On successful completion of VCE VET Health program students will be eligible for:

 a statement of attainment towards the completion of HLT33015 Certificate III in Allied Health Assistance



STUDY SCORE

To be eligible for a study score, students must:

- Satisfactorily achieve all the units of competency designated as the scored Units 3 and 4 sequence (two compulsory and one elective unit of competency).
 - 1. HLTAAP001 Recognise healthy body systems
 - 2. BSBMED301 Interpret and apply medical terminology appropriately
 - HLTHPS001 Take clinical measurements

Students will complete 3 course work tasks (66%) and an end of year examination (34%).





ATAR Contribution



Students wishing to receive an ATAR contribution for the VCE VET Health program Units 3 and 4 sequence must undertake scored assessment for the purpose of achieving a study score.



Where a student elects not to receive a study score no contribution to the ATAR will be available.

Attendance and Punctuality Requirements

Attendance

Students must attend all classes. An allowance of two absences a Semester or four for the year is allocated to students. An additional two approved absences is allowed for school camps, excursions etc. Where possible, students need to notify their VET Coordinators, trainers and/or their workplace in advance.

Punctuality

All students are expected to arrive on time to class. Students who arrive late will miss class content and will be required to catch up in their own time to complete the work.

Missing one class of VET is equal to missing a week of school.

Reports

- Schools will receive an interim VET report at the end of Term 1.
- Semester reports are distributed at the end of Semester 1 and 2.
- Statements of Results (issued at the end of the first year) and Certificates (full completion courses issued at the end of the second year) listing all units of competency upon satisfactorily completed.
- These are sent directly to the student's home school.

Please note, for partial completion courses only a statement of attainment can be issued. Certificates may not be sent until the following year, in accordance with graduation processes from the various training providers.

Program Costs

All VET programs facilitated through the IMVC attract costs. Through the clustering arrangement these costs are kept to a minimum where possible.

Please note: Please contact your school's VET Coordinator. All fees will be invoiced to schools after Census date usually in March. Once a student has commenced the course, the fees will not be refunded.

Communicating to Students

All correspondence and administrative issues will be communicated to students via their school-based VET Coordinator.

Occasionally, it may be appropriate to contact the student via SMS (e.g. to inform of a cancelled class) or email.

Parents must communicate directly with their school VET Coordinator and not initiate direct communication with VET trainers.

Confirming Expressions of Interest

Expression of Interests will be processed in late October.

Schools will be notified in November of the status of their students' Expressions of Interest.

Letters should be sent to students and parents by schools confirming enrolments by the end of November or early December.
